



Abstract Submission Guidelines and Criteria

1. Abstracts should be original research. Broadly, this could also include an audit, a case report, or a description of a new innovation in health services delivery or education; however the onus is on the author to demonstrate in their abstract the significance of any work offered for this Conference.
2. Your abstract must be submitted by the closing date, online in word format, using the abstract portal and abstract template.
3. Maximum word count = 300 words excluding references, authors names and addresses. Abstracts should be in Arial, 11 point font.
4. The abstract should be in the form of bolded structured headings (with blank line spaces between each section) as follows: **Title, Aims, Methods, Results, Conclusions**. Subheadings may be used but should not be given separate paragraphs. For audit submissions the following headings are appropriate: Problem, Design/Methods, Practice Change, Evaluation, Conclusions. Ideally the audit loop has been completed.
5. Do not use macros or photographs within your abstract.
6. Tables may be included with abstracts and must be cited in the abstract text. The abstracts themselves must be in text, not table format.
7. If references are included, these must be placed in the body of the text using names and journal references only but not the title. Only include references if direct reference is made to it in text of abstract.
8. Abbreviations may be used but must be spelt out in full at the first mention, followed by the abbreviation in parentheses.
9. All numerical data and statistical analysis (as appropriate) should be presented in the text of the abstract. Statements such as “findings will be discussed” or “data will be presented” are not appropriate, and will probably result in return or rejection of the abstract.
10. Multiple abstracts from the same overall study are welcome but need to be sufficiently different to justify multiple oral presentations.
11. It is unlikely that case reports will be accepted unless there are clear lessons to be learned. Literature Reviews may be accepted if it is a rigorous systematic review, i.e. there is a clear description of the literature search methods, criteria for inclusion and exclusion of articles and evidence of critical appraisal of the literature.
12. All accepted abstract submissions will be published on the conference website and the HITH Society Australasia website unless specific exclusion is requested (e.g. due to submission for publication elsewhere). The abstract submitted for review will be the final version for publication therefore a minimum standard is required. Please ensure:
 - Submitted abstracts follow the rules for formatting, including word length and font and to ensure they are not rejected. Please refer to the Abstract Template which can be downloaded from the website as a guideline for your submission.
 - Abstracts content that is unclear or confusing will be rejected. Members of the HITH Society Australasia who are the first time presenters can request assistance to write an abstract. Contact the Conference Secretariat at conference@hithsociety.org.au
 - Abstracts which give very little or no data will be rejected.

13. Judging: The highest ranking abstracts will be assigned an oral presentation (unless otherwise requested), with the remainder offered poster presentations. Abstracts will be judged on the following criteria:
 - Relevance to HITH
 - Originality of the research / project
 - Clarity of abstract
 - Potential impact of the findings to the audience
 - Does the results section include data
 - Does the abstract conform to the abstract guidelines
14. Presenters of accepted abstracts (oral and poster) are required to register and pay the Conference registration fee.
15. Authors will be notified of the results by **14 September 2018**.

Guidelines for Oral Presentation

In your presentation keep the introduction or background brief so that the majority of your talk can concentrate on the intervention and outcomes. It is recommended that introductions include reasons as to why the study being presented was undertaken, especially when/if it is similar to previous studies undertaken.
